The collection will launch on 19th October at The Mosaic Rooms in a limited edition art book to accompany Lawand's first UK solo exhibition entitled *Equinox*, *From Beirut to London*.

Now the sky is below him, the earth, above. Night is on his right, day on his left. He must dance through the blade of twilight, blundering into palm trees in a clatter of quills. See how his flesh feathers from his bones in a triple mirage – the hundred-handed one. He lifts into the buckled air and hangs there, over the abyss while the sun rat-tat-tats its Song of Songs in the hanging gardens, this fledged one, gliding in his element, a crest of flames sprouting from his head.



ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Pascale Petit was born in Paris and lives in London. She spent the first part of her life as a sculptor, before deciding to concentrate on poetry. Her previous books have been awarded Book of the Year in The Observer, Books of the Year in the Times Literary Supplement and Independent, and have been shortlisted for the T.S. Eliot Prize and Wales Book of the Year. She has worked as Poetry Editor of Poetry London and tutors courses at Tate Modern and for The Poetry School. ABOUT THE ARTIST

Born in Aleppo, Syria, in 1984, Lawand came to France with his family when he was ten. He has exhibited widely throughout Europe, as well as in Egypt in 2006 and Syria in 2007. He has also created and collaborated on art books with a number of renowned poets, most notably *Concerto for the 11th September 2001 BC* with the great Syrian poet Adonis. His work has also been published in France in contemporary poetry magazines such as N4728. He currently lives and works in Lille.
